Solomon, Ecclesiastes and You

For 2020, I have been teaching from the book of Ecclesiastes during our Christian Education hour. King Solomon's book is famous for its stark observations about life. Starting with one of the most well-known openings in all of literature:

Ecclesiastes 1:1 "The words of the Preacher, the son of David, king in Jerusalem. 2 Vanity of vanities, says the Preacher, vanity

of vanities! All is vanity. 3 What does man gain by all the toil at which he toils under the sun? 4 A generation goes, and a generation comes, but the earth remains forever. 5 The sun rises and the sun goes down, and hastens to the place where it rises. 6 The wind blows to the south, and goes around to the north, round and round goes the wind, and on its circuits the wind returns. 7 All streams run to the sea, but the sea is not full; to the place where the streams flow, there they flow again."

To this Solomon adds in Ecclesiastes 1:9b: ". . . there is nothing new under the sun."

This book has been one of the most provocative books to discuss, yielding much reflection and participation from everyone. But along with all this, there is a sense that Solomon's meditations were on one hand too far from the likes of us today, but on the other hand, strangely applicable to us all. So, what gives? And how are we to make sense of it all?

Our discussion explored the finitude of human experience as observed by Solomon. But really, as an absolute king and master over his land, would his thoughts really apply to any of us today? Ever time we thought we were getting close to Solomon, we were reminded of his fabulous wealth and his indescribable lifestyle. As Solomon said of himself . . .

Ecclesiastes 2:9 "So I became great and surpassed all who were before me in Jerusalem; also my wisdom remained with me. 10 And whatever my eyes desired I did not keep from them; I kept my heart from no pleasure, for my heart found pleasure in all my toil, and this was my reward for all my toil. 11 Then I considered all that my hands had dome and the

toil I had spent in doing it, and behold, all was vanity and a striving wind, and there was nothing to be gained under the sun."

Then I remembered an article about the quality of life of Medieval kings being roughly the equivalent to a middle-class person of our current times. In fact, the article pointed out that in many ways, the middle-class person of today has a much better quality of life (just think about basic medical care). And this was really before the availability and wide adoption of high-speed internet access! And, of course, within the past 50 years we, in America, have really denied ourselves no pleasure under the sun. Then the realization dawned on me that Solomon's meditation of the vanity of worldly living was VERY applicable to us today. Perhaps it is applicable more today than in any other time in world history!

Which brings us to what for me is the summation of Solomon's meditation on life. After all is said and done, this is what Solomon upholds:

Ecclesiastes 9:9 "Enjoy life with the wife you love, all the days of your vain life which he has given you under the sun, because that is your portion of life and in your toil at which you toil under the sun."

For all of his vaunted wisdom, wealth and womanizing, Solomon realizes at the end that none of it compares to the simple but profound love a man has for his wife. And all the rest are vanities. So what does this mean for us today.

- 1. In a direct sense, we should accept Solomon's wisdom to love the wife who is at home. This speaks volumes to us in our day of hyper-pumped up sensuality and stimulation.
- 2. And in a deep sense, understand what this first wisdom points to: that God is preparing us to become the bride of Jesus, who loves us perfectly.
- 3. Finally, we are blessed far more that Solomon could even understand in his lifetime!

Solomon lived hundreds of years before the coming of Jesus. In that, he is living through the growing understand that God reveals of the coming Savior. For instance, Solomon's father, David, authored the very psalms that meditates on the coming Lord:

Psalm 110:1 "A Psalm of David. 1 The LORD says to my lord, 'Sit at my right hand, till I make your enemies your footstool."

But we today are living with Jesus! For what Solomon could only dream of, we now have. Amazing how we are blessed in our lives today!

Hello from the faithful Deacons of Central Church.



 approved the retainer agreement with Philip A. Byler, Esq. in the matter of the Presbytery of Long Island vs. Central Presbyterian Church.



WHAT IS LENT?

Basically the season of Lent is a time to set aside! As we set aside time to spiritually prepare for Christmas Day, it makes sense to set aside time to prepare for the two most important days of the Christian calendar – Good Friday and Easter Day! Lent is a time that offers us an opportunity to come to terms with the human condition we may spend the rest of the year running from, and it brings our need for a Savior to the forefront.

Lent is an opportunity for us to contemplate what our Lord really did for us on the Cross – and it wasn't pretty. Ultimately the purpose of Lent does not stop at sadness and despair – it points us to the hope of the Resurrection and to the day when every tear will be dried.

The 2020 Lenten season began with Ash Wednesday on February 26th, and if you follow the 40 day transition, it ends on Holy Saturday, April 11th. During these 40 days, we set aside time to really examine areas of recurring sin in our lives that prevent us from being conformed to God's Will. The goal is to honestly examine our lives in light of God's Word, and to make a commitment to change in any areas you have not submitted to the Lord.

During Lent many take the opportunity to fast as well as pray, and if done correctly, it can be a powerful time of renewing our relationship with God. Fasting can be found in both the Old and New Testaments – it is a way of denying ourselves the excess of life so that we

might be more attuned to God's voice. It is also a way to discipline ourselves and strengthen ourselves so that when temptations arise in life, we are already used to saying "no" to our desires. Finally, it is also a particularly powerful way of participating, in a small way, in the sufferings of Christ. It can be very powerful when accompanied with prayer and confession.

(But a word of caution on fasting – make sure that when you fast you do not deprive yourself so that you do harm to your body. Fasting should be done by adults and mature teens and you should take into account any medical conditions or nutritional needs when deciding what and how much to abstain from.)

Finally, in addition to contemplation, confession, prayer and fasting, Scriptural meditation typically turns to the salvation offered to us through Christ's suffering as we read Old Testament Scriptures prophesying the suffering of Christ and the New Testament Gospel accounts.

Those who journey through the Lenten season will enter the Easter season with an increased appreciation for who God is and what He has done for us. And the joy of Resurrection, as well as the wonderful promises of eternity, will not be soon forgotten.
